IN AN EFFORT TO ASSIT YOU IN PREPARING FOR ANY WILDFIRE EVACUATION, WE ASK ALL RESIDENTS PLEASE READ THE FOLLOWING INFORMATION THROUGHLY AND BE PROPERLY PARPARED.

BE PREPARED TO EVACUATE FAST.

DISASTER EVACUATION PLAN

- Bring Cash, ID, and emergency kit With You.
- Isolate The Fire By Closing Your Front Doors As You Exit The Building. (Exit Routes are posted in many places in the building)
- Verbally Notify Those Around You As You Move Towards The Exit.
- In Case of Fire, Use the Stairway Only. <u>NEVER</u> Use Elevators.
- Get To A Safe Place And Call 9-1-1.
- Meet Outside The Building In A Safe Distance.
- DON'T Panic

PRE-EVACUATION PREPARATION STEPS

When an evacuation is anticipated, follow these checklists (if time allows) to give your home the best chance of surviving a wildfire.

Apartment Evacuation Plan:

Inside the Unit

- Have your <u>Emergency Supply Kit/Evacuation Bag</u>(Exhibit #1) ready to go
- Ensure a Wildfire Action Plan (on the next section) is prepared ahead of time
- Make sure you know your community's emergency response plan and have a plan on where to go when it is time to evacuate, and best routes for leaving your location.
- Shut all windows and doors, leaving them unlocked.
- Shut off the air conditioning.

Outside

- Gather up flammable items from the balcony and bring them inside
- Put your Emergency Supply Kit in your vehicle.
- Drive the vehicle loaded from the car-lift and garage. Carry your car keys with you.
- Drive your vehicle away from car-lift/garage ahead is highly recommended. You and your family can avoid any possible mal-function of the car-lift because of fire, power outage, over-capacity or even blockage at exit.
- Don't wait for an evacuation order if you feel threatened.
- Check on neighbors and make sure they are preparing to leave.

Animals

• Keep your pets nearby or inside the vehicle.

DISASTER ACTION PLAN (EARTHQUAKE, FIRE, HEAVY SMOKE ETC)

Your Disaster Action Plan must be prepared, and familiar to all members of your household well in advance of a wildfire. Use the checklist below to help create your plan.

Ensure you plan with COVID-19 in mind. Ask friends or relatives outside your area if you would be able to stay with them, should the need arise. If you do need to evacuate and plan to stay with friends or relatives, ask first if they have symptoms of COVID-19 or have people in their home at higher risk for serious illness. If that is the case, make other arrangements. Check with hotels, motels and campgrounds to learn if they are open. Also get set by learning about your community's response plan for each disaster and determine if these plans have been adapted because of COVID-19.

Create an evacuation plan that includes:

- A designated emergency meeting location outside the fire or hazard area. This is critical to determine who has safely evacuated from the affected area.
- Several different escape routes from the premise and community. Practice these often so everyone in your family is familiar in case of emergency.
- A <u>Family Communication Plan</u> (Exhibit #2) that designates an out-of-area friend or relative as a point of contact to act as a single source of communication among family members in case of separation. (It is easier to call or message one person and let them contact others than to try and call everyone when phone, cell, and internet systems can be overloaded or limited during a disaster.)

Be Prepared:

- Have fire extinguishers on hand Or know where they are located and train your family how to use them.
- Assemble an <u>Emergency Supply Kit</u> for each person, as recommended by the American Red Cross. (See next section for details.)
- Maintain a list of emergency contact numbers posted you can easily access and in your emergency supply kit.
- Keep an extra <u>Emergency Supply Kit</u> in your car in case you cannot get to your unit because of fire or other emergency.
- Have a portable radio or scanner so you can stay updated on the fire.

PREPARE YOUR FAMILY

How to Prepare to Evacuate from a Disaster

Evacuation plans for families with young children should include helping toddlers understand how to quickly respond in case of fire, and how adults can escape with babies. Prepare ahead of time by practicing your family's fire escape plan, and what to do to be safe when facing a disaster.

It is important to talk to toddlers and small children at a level that they understand and that does not frighten. 

Exhibit #1 : Emergency Supply Kit



- Prescription medications and glasses
- Infant formula and diapers
- Pet food and extra water for your pet
- Important family documents such as copies of insurance policies, identification and bank account records in a waterproof, portable container
- Cash or traveler's checks and change
- Emergency reference material such as a first aid book or information from www.ready.gov
- Sleeping bag or warm blanket for each person. Consider additional bedding if you live in a cold-weather climate.
- Complete change of clothing including a long sleeved shirt, long pants and sturdy shoes. Consider additional clothing if you live in a cold-weather climate.
- Household chlorine bleach and medicine dropper When diluted nine parts water to one part bleach, bleach can be used as a disinfectant. Or in an emergency, you can use it to treat water by using 16 drops of regular household liquid bleach per gallon of water. Do not use scented, color safe or bleaches with added cleaners.
- Fire Extinguisher
- A Matches in a waterproof container
- Feminine supplies and personal hygiene items
- Mess kits, paper cups, plates and plastic utensils, paper towels
- Paper and pencil
- Books, games, puzzles or other activities for children





	Recommended Items to Include In a Basic Emergency Supply Kit:
	Water, one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation
	Food, at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
	Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both
	Flashlight and extra batteries
	First aid kit
	Whistle to signal for help
	Dust mask, to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
	Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
	Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
	Can opener for food (if kit contains canned food)
	Local maps

Through its Ready Campaign, the Federal Emergency Management Agency educates and empowers Americans to take some simple steps to prepare for and respond to potential emergencies, including natural disasters and terrorist attacks. Ready asks individuals to do three key things: get an emergency supply kit, make a family emergency plan, and be informed about the different types of emergencies that could occur and their appropriate responses.

All Americans should have some basic supplies on hand in order to survive for at least three days if an emergency occurs. Following is a listing of some basic items that every emergency supply kit should include. However, it is important that individuals review this list and consider where they live and the unique needs of their family in order to create an emergency supply kit that will meet these needs. Individuals should also consider having at least two emergency supply kits, one full kit at home and smaller portable kits in their workplace, vehicle or other places they spend time.
